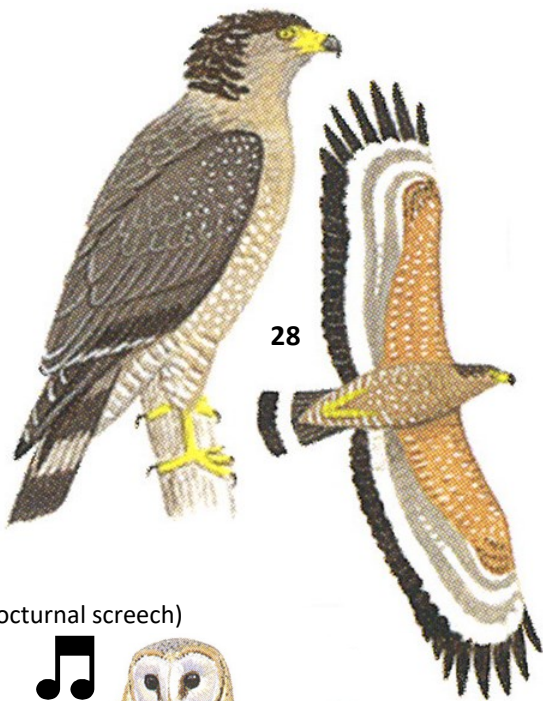

Good places to look are the lakes, TTS bridge and gardens, SA bridge, sports field and palm plantations; esp. at dawn and dusk.

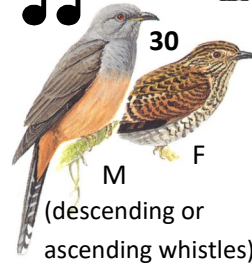
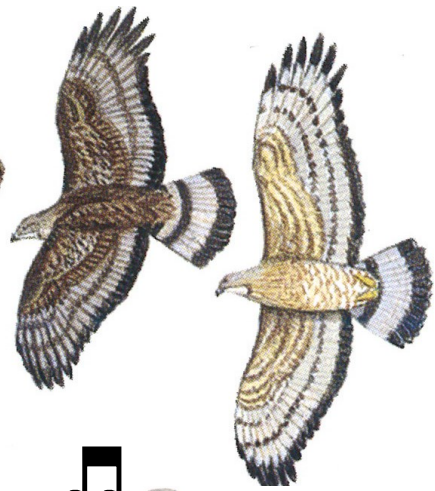

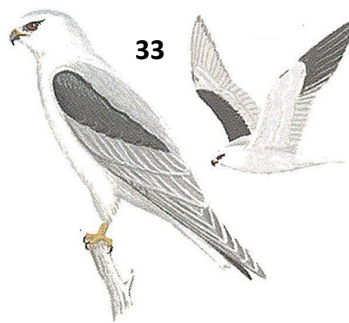
